Mr. Bale asked if the gas company had finished opening roads; the Borough Attorney informed that the Borough has been having issues with unauthorized street openings by utility companies, which triggered the ordinance that was passed that evening.
- 2. Paul Edinger, Monmouth Rd, West Long Branch stated that he was present on behalf of his client, the owner of 6 Delaware Ave, to which a road opening permit was denied due to the paving moratorium. James Attardi, Bowne Rd, Ocean Township was also present on behalf of the owner of 6 Delaware. The owner of 6 Delaware would like to open the road to connect to gas services and Mr. Edinger, his attorney, communicated that a moratorium-based denial imposes great inconvenience on the owner and requested that the Council reconsider.
